What is bullying?

Bullying is made up of different behaviours intended to deliberately hurt, threaten, frighten or exclude someone by physical and non-

physical means over extended periods of time. An individual or group may direct these behaviours towards another individual or group. Someone is bullying another person when:

- They **repeatedly** verbally abuse a person or group by calling them unpleasant names, by writing them nasty notes and or messages (electronically or by hand) or by using unpleasant gestures.
- They **repeatedly** physically harm a person or group or physically intimidate them by threatening physical harm or by destroying/taking their belongings without permission.
- They **repeatedly** encourage their friends or people they know to verbally, physically threaten a • person or group; or ask them to harass, embarrass, ignore or exclude that person or group from activities.

Bullying may take one, two, or all these forms. **Repeatedly** means that they do these things to that person or group the majority of the time they talk about them, see them or spend time around them.

Research has shown that bullying has negative, long-term consequences for all involved.

Such consequences include:

- For victims constant feelings of rejection, low self-regard, fear, an inability to solve problems with others in acceptable ways, relationship difficulties, and problems with achieving full potential academically and socially.
- For bullies an increased risk of criminal behaviour.

As such, bullying behaviours have no place at this College.

Student Management Interviews

During the last few weeks the teachers have been surveyed to identify students who are disrupting the learning environment here at the College. Any student who was identified by two teachers or more will be required to attend an interview with a parent or guardian and the appropriate Leader of Mission or in some instances Mr Gawthorne, the Head of Mission or Mrs Sparkes, the Assistant Principal.

Research around learning clearly indicates that the learning environment needs to be engaging for the students if they are to learn. Each time this engagement is compromised by poor behaviour, valuable learning time is lost.

Parents please be assured that these interviews are a support mechanism for both the teacher and yourself, to ensure that your son/daughter realises how important it is for them to participate fully in every lesson, so that they can achieve their personal best. They also serve the purpose of supporting other students within the classroom whose learning is being directly affected by the behaviour of a few.



Jessie-Rose Walklate – An Archer of Distinction

In 2014, Jessie-Rose Walklate from Year 11.3 competed in the World Field Archery Championships in Yankton USA. Since the competition, Jessie-Rose has set her sights on becoming the best junior female archer in every style of archery and working hard on Target archery (FITA).

Last month, Jessie-Rose completed in the State Field (IFAA) Championships (Field) held in Eurobodalla (Batemans Bay). The competition was a grueling couple of days with her having to shoot over 300 arrows over the weekend, resulting in her attaining a gold medal.

Rosie has also been shooting in all the qualifying rounds of Target (FITA) Archery trying for selection on the 10 member NSW State Team for the upcoming National Junior Championships being held in Penrith during April, with Jessie-Rose being advised on 9th March 2015 that she had been successful.

As Rosie now shoots all styles of archery, she is training hard to be fit enough for the Nationals for both Field (IFAA) and Target (FITA) archery in April. She will be competing for four days in Wagga Wagga for the ABA

& 3D nationals and then returning to Penrith to compete in the junior target nationals (4 days) the next day.

Can she be crowned ABA, 3D, Field & Target champion all in the same week? She is 100% committed and prepared to give it a go, shooting over 600 arrows over eight consecutive days of competition. We at St Columba's Catholic College certainly wish her well and hope that she stays strong.

Australia-Japan Relations Essay Contest 2015



St Columba's Catholic College entered the 1st Australia-Japan Relations Essay Contest for NSW and NT secondary school students in November last year. The contest was conducted by the Consulate-General of Japan in Sydney with the co-operation Commonwealth of the Department of Education. Training and Youth Affairs. The aim of the contest is to encourage develop and a better understanding of Australia-Japan relations among Australian secondary school students.

Two of our students, Simone Cooper and Ryan Nightingale

(Year 9) were awarded a special prize by the Consulate-General of Japan for their outstanding essays.

Simone and Ryan and their families attended an award ceremony at the Consulate-General's Official Residence in Bellevue Hill, Sydney on the 11th March accompanied by the Principal, Mr Paul Ryan and Japanese teacher Mrs Shizue Sato.

Simone won the Junior Division for the students in Years in 7 and 8 and Ryan's essay was awarded as "Highly Commended Essay" by the judges.

The ceremony was held on the 11th March, the fourth year commemoration of the Tsunami disaster in 2011. The Consulate-General of Japan, Sydney, Mr Takaoka expressed the importance of the close relationships between the countries and his appreciation to the Australian Government as Australia was one of the first countries to send assistance to Japan during the time of devastation in Japan. He also expressed how impressed he was with the depth of cross-cultural understanding and the great effort our students displayed in their essays.

Simone made a speech as the winner of the junior division. She said, "Through participating in this project, I have gained invaluable insight into the ways in which Australia views Japan and how we can bring out many strengths together in order to benefit and enrich both nations immensely."

Ryan said "Our goal was to write an essay describing how Japan is viewed by Australians. At first I found this quite daunting as it meant doing extra research, at times it was hard to continue because it was extra work but at the end I was glad that I had completed my work. This contest was a wonderful experience and I would strongly advise other students to participate in this amazing contest. Thank you to Mrs Sato and Miss McArthur for this opportunity and for helping us with our essays".

It was a joint project between the Japanese department and the English department.

The contest is very prestigious and competitive, and students must comply with all the requirements to complete their essays. We appreciate Mr Ryan for his time attending the ceremony with us and his ongoing support. We would like to thank Mrs McCauley, Mrs Pip Moore and Mrs Morrison for their support to check students' draft copies so generously.

We congratulate Simone and Ryan on their brilliant achievement and all the students who participated in this competition for their great effort.

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
