

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


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LIBRARY NEWS

- **3.** Carefully choose your Electives in Years 9 and 10. Selection could involve the results of your careers assessments, innate gifts, personal interests and previous class results
- 4. In relation to your subjects, skills, interests and favourite electives, research the possible professions which align with them. See www.myfuture.edu.au and go to the bottom of the home page and view the "Bullseye Posters."
- 5. Once you have decided on five (5) specific vocations:

Research specific information about the vocation at www.jobguide.education.gov.au skills and tasks for the job

Understand the required

Discern the required tertiary institution qualifications

- **6. Carefully choose your Electives in Years 11 and 12**. Technical College and Universities may sometimes require specific prerequisites from Senior School studies. Therefore, Elective choices may need to be looked at closely when choosing to progress to the next level in Tertiary education
- 7. Prepare yourself for the transferable Employ-ability Skills:

Verbal Communication; Teamwork; Commercial Awareness; Analysing and Investigating; Initiative/Self Motivation; Drive' Written Communication' Planning and Organising; Flexibility; Time Management

An Open Letter to all Catholic School Parents in Diocese of Parramatta

Dear Parents and Carers

On Friday last week, Rev Fr Peter Williams (Administrator of the Diocese of Parramatta), Rev Fr Chris De Souza (Priest Responsible for Education), Greg Whitby (Executive Director of Schools), and I met with MPs and candidates from both the Labor and Coalition parties. Our aim was to ensure that both sides of politics were aware of the key issues affecting Catholic schools and families particularly:

- To ensure future legislation did not prevent our schools maintaining their Catholic identity and
- contributes about 25% of all government funding to Catholic schools To ensure a commitment to ongoing funding of Catholic schools (the state government
- To seek a commitment to a coherent educational policy (pre to post school)
